Hello SNAP Members! I had the privilege to serve as your Legislative Coordinator this year and I can't believe how quickly it went by! The year started off with writing the SNAP Board's Resolution entitled "In support of increasing awareness of the psychosocial needs of children of alcoholics". After editing the resolution and communicating with NSNA's Resolution Committee, the resolution was presented in Orlando, Florida and was passed!

SNAP also had its Capitol Hill Step by Step day in April. The day was incredibly successful and we were able to hear from wonderful speakers including our professional consultant and parliamentarian, David Ranck, and SNAP Alum and past NSNA Vice President Elizabeth Long. We also had a special guest Representative Kevin Schrieber, who spoke to us about the importance of nurses being involved in the legislative process.

After Capitol Hill Step by Step and NSNA convention, I shifted my focus to writing the 2016 SNAP Board Resolution. This year I had the privilege to attend the International Nurses Society on Addiction annual conference in Las Vegas, Nevada, where I had the opportunity to listen to experts on addiction discuss the severity of the opioid epidemic and possible ways nurses can help. 129 people die every day from opioid abuse, and there is still an incredible amount of stigma preventing patients all over the world from seeking help. Therefore, I decided to write a resolution about increasing awareness regarding prescription opioid abuse.

In addition to writing this resolution, I am excited to work with my resolution committee this year: Danielle Bernardin from Widener University, Jonathon Krout from York College of Pennsylvania, and Meghan Scanlon from Villanova University. We will be preparing all the resolutions we receive to be presented at SNAP Convention. I am so excited to be working with three such talented individuals.

I wanted to thank you all for giving me this opportunity to work as your Legislative Coordinator this year. I hope to continue to work



with all of you at some point in the future!
